## Holes (cont.) as interpreted by the National Grading Rule for Dimension Lumber:

Manufactured Holes: The area of a manufactured hole shall not exceed the equivalent area of the knot hole permitted and is limited to one manufactured hole in lengths of 12' or less of length, or two in lengths longer than 12' provided that they don't occur in the same cross section. The following length restrictions shall apply:

SELECT STRUCTURAL: equal in length to diameter of hole permitted

NO. 1 and CONSTRUCTION: equal in length to 1-1/2 times diameter of hole permitted.

## B) Manufactured Holes clarification

Mr. Easterling requested that Mr. Jay Moore explain the reasoning behind the requested clarification to the manufactured holes provision in the NGR. Mr Moore indicated that Mr. David Conner at the NGR subcommittee meeting had pointed out that as currently worded two holes would be permitted in the same cross section for lengths longer than 12 feet. The subcommittee felt that this should not be permissible and proposed a clarification be added to the manufactured holes section of the NGR interpretations. Mr. Easterling made a motion which was seconded by Mr. Singleton to add the following additional clause: "provided that they don't occur in the same cross section" to the Manufactured Holes paragraph on page 24 of the NGR interpretations. *The motion passed unanimously.* 

**Motion:** The Committee Endorses the following proposed revision to add the following additional clause to Manufactured Holes paragraph on page 24 of the NGR interpretations:

Manufactured Holes: The area of a manufactured hole shall not exceed the equivalent area of the knot hole permitted and is limited to one manufactured hole in lengths of 12' or less of length, or two in lengths longer than 12' provided that they don't occur in the same cross section. The following length restrictions shall apply:

SELECT STRUCTURAL: equal in length to diameter of hole permitted.

NO. 1 and CONSTRUCTION: equal in length to 1-1/2 times diameter of hole permitted.

NO. 2 and STANDARD: equal in length to width of piece.

NO. 3, UTILITY and STUD: equal in length to 1-1/2 times width of piece.
